Introducing the Massachusetts Coalition for Water Resources Stewardship (MCWRS)


- A Massachusetts 501(c)(4) non-profit organization
- Formed in 2008
- Governed by Elected Board of Directors
- Formed out of frustration with regulations and permit conditions that disregarded the costs and the realities of managing municipal water infrastructure

MCWRS Mission Statement

 The Massachusetts Coalition for Water Resources Stewardship (MCWRS) is a nonprofit organization committed to promoting watershed-based policies and regulations that effectively manage and conserve water resources. MCWRS is unique in its focus on protecting municipalities' interests in an ever changing regulatory environment. We promote using scientifically based, fiscally responsible approaches to realize environmental and community goals. Members include municipalities; public agencies that transport and treat drinking water, wastewater and stormwater; quasi-government agencies; and private organizations whose members are committed to the principles of stewardship and sustainability in protecting the environment and public health.

- Working behind the scenes, out of sight and out of mind is a thing of the past
- Generally viewed as part of government, which more and more people loathe, just because...
- Ratepayers don't want to pay more (or at all) for water, wastewater and stormwater services
- Environmental advocates blame us for what they view as damaged natural resources and want us to fix all the problems regardless of costs

- Too many elected officials strive to make everyone happy while hoping to avoid making tough decisions
- Environmental regulatory agencies answer to elected officials and may succumb to pressure from environmental advocates
- Water and wastewater utilities exist to provide services for their communities and face the conundrum of trying to balance system needs with the financial health of the community they serve

(But don't spend any money)

- Advocacy Is Not Just About Pushing Back on Regulations and Permits
 - Support MassDEP NPDES Delegation because it is good for municipalities
 - Support legislation to enhance funding of water, wastewater and stormwater projects
 - Will support efforts that assist municipalities in the management of water infrastructure

Challenges to Effective Advocacy

- Go it alone rather than a joint effort
- Don't understand the problem and its effects until it is too late
- Don't know the rules
- Don't have the time or manpower to get involved
- Decisions made at a higher level
- Stay under the radar


Challenges to Effective Advocacy

- Environmental Advocates most frequent opponent
 - Organized
 - Strategic
 - Simple, Consistent Message
 - United Front
 - Ability to openly criticize legislators makes them a feared, powerful political force
 - Not burdened with implementing permits or regulations-can focus on advancing their agenda


Tools and Strategies

- Use Social Media


Another Useful Tool




- Draft Permit (3rd attempt) issued September 30, 2014
- Impacts all or part of 260 municipalities
- Get word out that comments are needed, provide template and key points
- Over 150 comment letters received by EPA by February 27, 2015




- Final Permit issued in April 2016
- Convened group of interested municipalities to discuss an appeal
- Appeal Filed August2016
- EPA agrees to postpone permit effective date for 1 year



- EPA suggests mediation in attempt to resolve issues and avoid litigation
- Mediator appointed in fall 2017 and all parties agree to participate
- Mediation proceeds this winter/spring...then what?
 - Resolution?
 - Litigation?
 - Future Permit Postponement?



- The Sideshow
 - MA Rivers Alliance sues EPA to overturn postponement
 - Boston Globe weighs in denouncing appeal and postponement
 - MA AG sides with Rivers Alliance filing Amicus Brief on postponement suit



Conclusion

- Water and Wastewater Utilities need help in telling their story
- Balancing the discussion on water resources issues requires strategic thinking and a team approach
- Working together and delivering a consistent message is critical
