Maine

161 POTWs.

41 Satellite Sewer Systems.

Wastewater Infrastructure Needs:

= \$1 billion

\$100 million per year.



Sources of Funding

CWSRF Loans & Principle Forgiveness

USDA Rural Development Grant and Loans

Community Development Block Grants

State Grants



Most of Maine is a small town

- 14% < 1,000 population
- 47% < 2,500 population
- 61% < 5,000 population

• 70% < MHI \$50,000

Need grants to keep rates affordable.



Bonding

 State grants through bonds approved by legislature and voters.

- Process is very time consuming.
- Multiple competing needs and budget politics makes outcome uncertain.

Sustainable Wastewater Funding

Dedicated and sustainable source of funding adequate to meet the long term needs of Maine's wastewater infrastructure.



New Legislation

 LD 347 - An Act To Provide Sustainable Funding for Drinking Water and Wastewater Infrastructure"

 Second try. In 2009 a similar bill created three empty funds, but no money.




